LITERACY IS LOOKING A LITTLE DIFFERENT THESE DAYS

WHAT IS THE SCIENCE OF READING?

Over the last few years, there has been a shift in education to incorporate more of the science behind learning to read into instruction. It's important so we wanted to explain.



Do you know why the O in NO is long and the O in NOT is short? Tricky question, right?! If you don't know why, are you able to still decode the word? Most likely.


English is a complex language, but not so much we can't make sense of it. The example above has a simple explanation. When a syllable ends in

a vowel, it is open, and the vowel sound is then long. When a syllable ends with one or more consonants it's closed and the vowel sound is then short. So, in the word, NO the vowel is long because it's open, and in the word NOT it's short because it's closed. Easy right?



But if you didn't know this, how could you read those words? What's happening for most is that our brains are just exposed to this concept so many times that it automatically known which yours lite upo But what about these who aren't paturally

automatically knows which vowel to use. But what about those who aren't naturally making those connections. And really, shouldn't we all know this? Wouldn't knowing why help us to decode other more complex words? Yes, and that's part of the science behind learning to read!



Now, this brings us to the question at hand, what is the Science of Reading? It's just what it says, the SCIENCE behind and study of how people learn to read. It's a body of academic work from linguists, neuropsychologists, cognitive psychologists, master teachers, researchers, and so many more.

Learning to read really is like rocket science and it's challenging educators as professionals to change how we teach. Like in the example above, we

are planning meaningful instruction for our students that follow what we currently know from the science of reading.

This is just one of the very powerful shifts in our instruction happening this year. We are excited about this change and know it will help our students immensely in their journey to becoming fluent readers. We will be sharing more information as the year goes on but if this is something you want to learn more about, we highly recommend checking this QR-linked article that explains a lot of the why. 
